Operation Pet Care

Each year, millions of healthy cats and dogs find themselves without one important thing. It's the thing they need most of all—a good home.

The main reason so many animals are without homes is that not enough people spay or neuter their pets. Those operations prevent animals from having babies. They also help prevent many serious diseases in pets.
