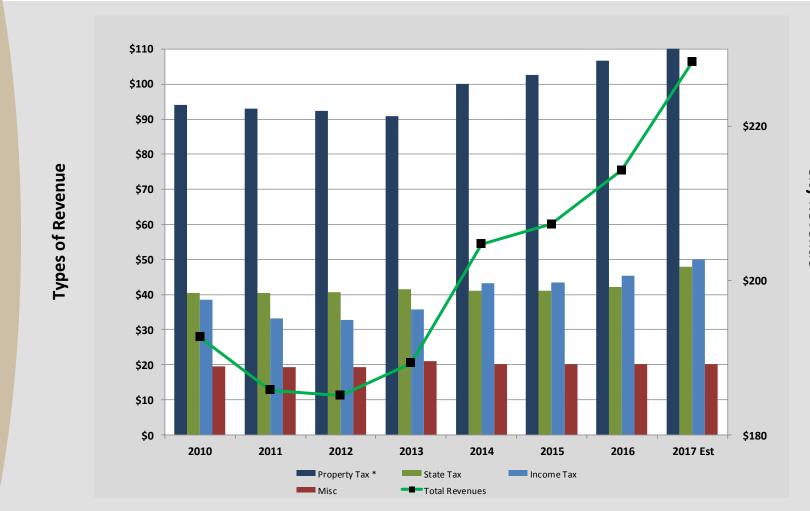

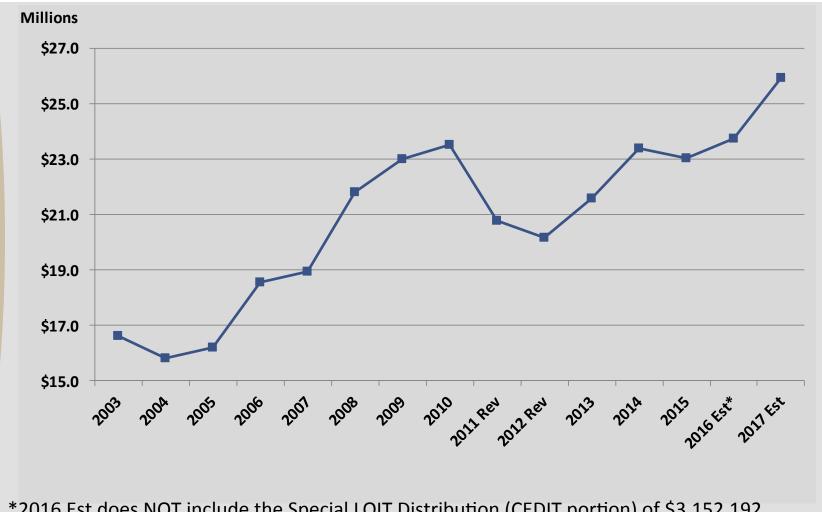

Local Income Tax (LIT) – Economic Development Distribution to City (formerly CEDIT)

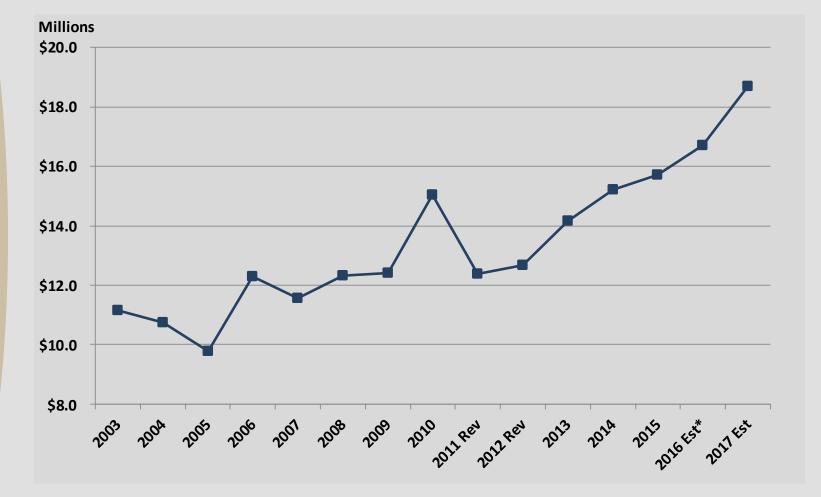

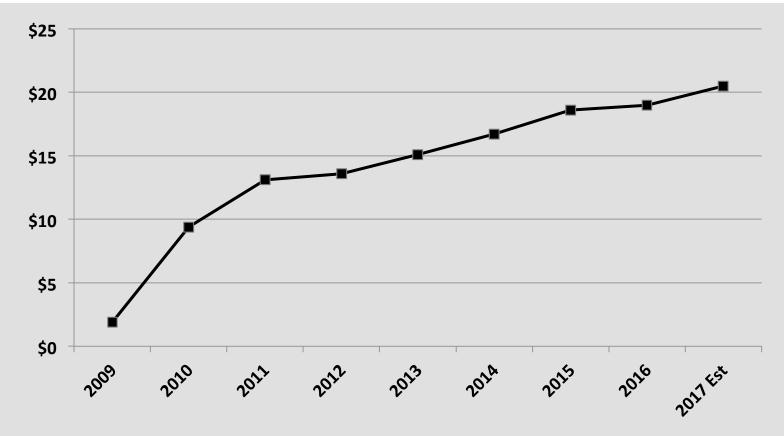

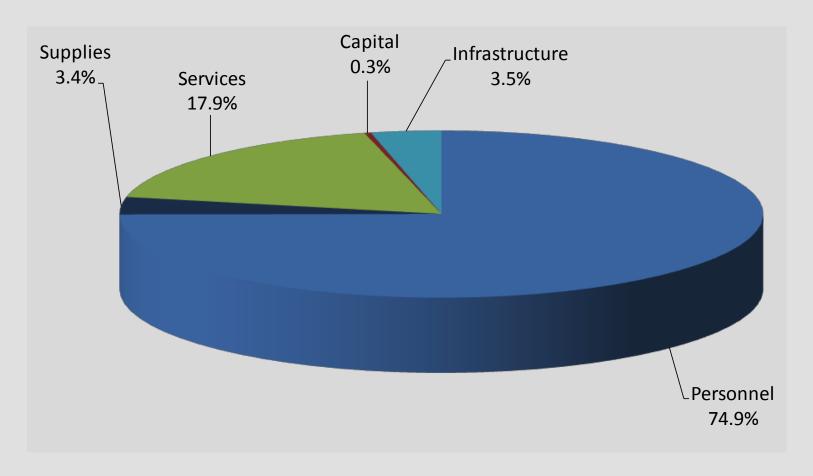

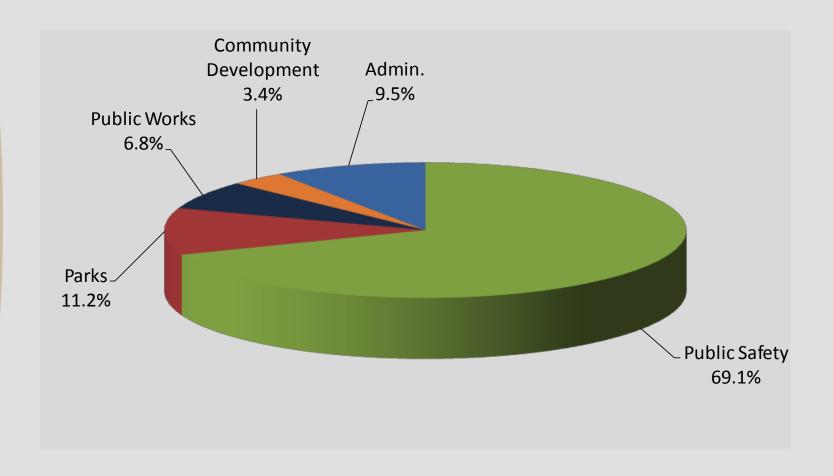
2017 Property Tax/PS LOIT Expenses by Series

Fiscal Notes



- Assessed Value growth 2 years in a row
- Competitive Labor Market
- Fire and Police at full TARGET staffing
- Increase cash reserves by \$5.2 million
- Levy growth of 3.8%
- Budget growth less than 1%
- Capital spending of \$23.8 million = IN TARGET
- Parks project work funded @ \$7.7 million
